ADJUSTMENT IN SEWER USER FEES

In February 2012, in compliance with Government Code section 53756 and Proposition 218, the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 2809 providing for automatic annual adjustments for a five (5) year period for the inflation of construction costs, based on the Engineering News Record Construction Costs Index – Los Angeles Area (ENR), without further action by the City Council. However, if the inflation adjustment in any year exceeds six (6) percent, the amount of the inflation adjustment shall be presented to the City Council for final legislative determination.

The applicable ENR for the 2015 inflation adjustment is 2.5%. Therefore, effective July 1, 2015, the Sewer Base Rates, Usage Charge Rate, and Maximum Billing Caps will increase by 2.5%. Under this adjustment, the average residential customer's sewer bill will increase by approximately \$0.60 per every bi-monthly bill. A customer's sewer bill will increase more or less, depending upon how much water is used. In compliance with Ordinance No. 2809, a 30-day notice was mailed to sewer customers on May 28, 2015. The notice contains information concerning the reasons for the rate adjustment and the increase in the sewer user fees.

Dear Valued Sewer Customer:

The Garden Grove Sanitary District values customer service first and foremost, and strives to keep our ratepayers well informed. The District is committed to providing its ratepayers with a reliable, high quality and cost efficient sewer service that protects the health and safety of the public and property of the community.

In 2012, the City adopted an ordinance providing for automatic as needed adjustments to the sewer rate components (1. Sewer User Fee Base Rates; 2. Usage Charge Rate; and 3. Maximum Billing Caps) over a five (5) year period to account for actual inflation in construction costs. Under the ordinance, these sewer rate components will be adjusted for inflation annually on July 1, commencing July 1, 2012 and continuing through July 1, 2016, based on the percentage of the annual increase in construction costs from March 1 of the prior year to February 28 of the current year, as determined by the Engineering News Record Construction Costs Index – Los Angeles Area ("ENR"). Over the last five (5) years, the average annual inflation rate under the ENR has been between zero (0) to four and a half (4.5) percent.

The applicable ENR for the 2015 inflation adjustment, as measured from March 1, 2014 through February 28, 2015, is 2.5%. Without this annual adjustment for inflation, the District may not be able to generate the funds required to operate and maintain the District's sewer system, to make necessary capital improvements, to meet debt obligations, and to comply with regulations imposed by State and Federal agencies.

The owner(s) of each parcel of property connected to the District's sewage collection system is assigned to one or more customer classes, based on property use, and is responsible for the payment of a separate monthly Sewer Service Charge for each portion of the parcel served by a separate metered water service. Each monthly Sewer Service Charge consists of a Base Rate (according to customer class), plus a Usage Charge, but cannot exceed the Maximum Billing Cap designated for each customer class. The amount of the variable Usage Charge is based on the amount of water used per month during the bi-monthly period of lowest consumption (determined annually, based on analysis of 12 months of water billing data). Effective July 1, 2015, the Base Rates, Usage Charge Rate, and Maximum Billing Caps will increase by 2.5%, as a result of the inflation adjustment.

CONSERVATION STANDARD TIER FOR MANDATED WATER USE REDUCTION

On May 18, 2015, the State Water Resources Control Board (State) updated the emergency conservation regulations with the intention of safeguarding urban water supplies in the event of continued drought, minimizing the potential for waste and unreasonable use of water, and achieving the 25% statewide potable water usage reduction ordered by Governor Brown.

The update included an additional regulation that placed each urban water supplier into a "conservation standard tier", which identified the percentage of which each urban water supplier must reduce their water use by February 2016. The conservation standard tiers range from 8%-36% and is based on the urban water supplier's average July-September 2014 residential gallons per capita daily (R-GPCD). Garden Grove reported an R-GPCD of 134 and was placed into the 28% conservation standard tier.

Staff re-evaluated the calculations and found that the reported R-GPCD was inaccurate. Staff re-submitted the State reports with an R-GPCD of 98. On June 9, 2015, the State accepted the new submission and placed Garden Grove into the 20% conservation standard tier. Therefore, Garden Grove is mandated to reduce water use by 20% by February 2016 for each month as compared to 2013 water use.

Enclosed is the May 2015 Investment Report which shows the financial institutions, types of investment instruments, monthly transactions, current month interest received, and the par and fair market value of investments held. The month-end cash in the bank and petty cash balances are also listed on the Cash and Investment Report. The pie chart reflects the investment instruments as a percentage of the total portfolio.

This investment portfolio meets State guidelines and adheres to the City investment policy. As of May 2015, the City invested 21.832% of its total portfolio in treasury securities and 52.374% in federally backed securities. 20.166% of the portfolio or \$41.565 million is invested in the Local Agency Investment Fund (LAIF) managed by the California State Treasurer. A portion of the investment portfolio is restricted as they are funds held and invested by an outside fiscal agent. The restrictions were set forth in the related bond indentures. As of May 2015, 5.628% of the portfolio is restricted. Please see chart on attachment A.

In summary, the investment portfolio is secured and the City has the necessary cash to pay its bills for six months in a timely manner.



Woman, dog killed by driver suspected of DUI

GARDEN GROVE • A woman in her 50s was riding along a major street Tuesday night with her dog in a tricycle basket when a driver suspected of DUI struck them, killing both, police said.

Rita Faye McLaughlin, 58, of Santa Ana was driving a small pickup east on Chapman Avenue around 9:45 p.m. when she crashed into a woman riding an adult-size tricycle in the same lane near the Faye Avenue intersection, police Capt. Ben Stauffer said.

Authorities said the woman was riding with a small dog in the basket of the tricycle and both were thrown from the vehicle because of the collision.

Garden Grove Fire Department paramedics pronounced the unidentified woman dead at the scene. The dog was taken to an Orange County Animal Services clinic, where it later died, police said.

McLaughlin stopped after the collision and was given a field sobriety test, which she failed, Stauffer

said.

She was arrested on suspicion of felony DUI and was booked into Orange County Jail before posting bond and being released at 10:16 a.m., according to jail records.

Police closed down the street during the investigation but reopened it at 5:20 a.m. Wednesday.





Fireworks citations will cost you \$1,000


The Garden Grove Police Department issued 51 citations in 2014 for using or possessing illegal fireworks, or misusing or tampering with legal ones during Fourth of July.

The citations come with \$1,000 administrative fines.

In 2013, the Police Department gave out 55 citations. The highest number of citations issued during Fourth of July came in 2007 – the first year the fines were in effect – when the department gave out 126.

Police and fire officials will once again step up patrols during the celebration to make sure people are properly setting off "Safe and Sane" fireworks, and are not using illegal ones.

Residents using legal fireworks must be diligent about safety this Fourth of July, because of increased fire danger caused by the drought and water restrictions, police say. Browning turf and dry landscapes have created hazardous conditions. Even exhausted fireworks can spark fires.

GG police and fire departments urge residents to be careful

This year, in addition to warnings against the use of illegal fireworks, both Garden Grove police and fire departments are cautioning fireworks users to be especially aware of an increased fire danger due to dry surroundings.

Browning turf and dried trees, shrubbery, and landscapes — the result of tightened water restrictions -have created hazardous fire conditions: Flames, sparks, and even heat coming from extinguished fireworks are strong reasons for concern.

"As the weather heats up and the grass and brush get drier, it's important that we all do our part to prevent fires. Use safe and sane fireworks only with adult on high-activity illegal fireworks supervision and report illegal fireworks to the authorities. Your Fire Department is committed to yours and your family's safety,"

said Fire Chief Tom Schultz.

During the upcoming Independence Day holiday weekend, the police and fire departments will, again, increase their patrols to identify violators of the city's municipal code on fireworks. Using or possessing illegal fireworks, including misusing or tampering with legal ones, carries a \$1,000 administrative fine.


"This is a great event that is really important. I encourage everyone from the community to come out and support the MDA and firefighters," said Garden Grove Fire Chief Tom Schultz.

Fire causes \$55,000 in damages

Firefighters able to save two high school diplomas

Garden Grove fire crews were dispatched to the 12900 block of Palm Street last week for a residential structure fire.

The first engine company on the scene reported heavy smoke showing from a second floor apartment. An aggressive fire attack and search for trapped victims was initiated by the initial

The incident was upgraded to a working structure assignment that included four engines, two trucks, paramedic squad, safety

officer. PIO and two battalion chiefs' dispatched. The fire was knocked down in 10 minutes, and there were no reported injuries to residents or fire fighters.

An investigation revealed the fire to be accidental with more than one source of possible ignition. The Red Cross was requested for three families that were displaced. Damage was estimated at \$25,000 for structure, and \$30,000 for contents. Crews were able to save two of the residents' high school diplomas.

Pinochle keeps 99 year old vital, sharp

World War II veteran says game keeps his mind off troublesome memories

Pinochle originated during the 19th century in the Swiss-German and Swiss-French areas of Europe, along with France, showing the most popularity in the 1950s.

Theodore "Ted" Settannil, who turned 99 last week, is an avid Pinochle player at the Garden Grove Senior Center and is a master of the game, faithfully playing four times each week at 12:30 p.m., where he joins other Pinochle enthusiasts.

"I tried all of the other senior centers in Orange County and the Garden Grove Senior Center is the best for Pinochle," he said. "They are fair and give everyone a chance to play; I've been coming here to play Pinochle for 13 years."

Pinochle is a card game for two or more players using a 48-card deck consisting of two of each card from 9 to ace, the object being to score points for various combinations and to win tricks with a combination of queen of spades and jack of diamonds.

Asked if he attributes his longevity to playing Pinochle, Settannil said, "It helps because it requires concentration and takes your mind off of your problems. My family didn't live to be exceptionally old because they smoked; I attribute my life beyond all of my family, to the fact that I gave up smoking a long time ago.

"I've been playing Pinochle for 60 years and got my start playing the game while living in Connecticut, where I was raised, even though I was born in Mt. Vernon New York."

Asked what brought him out to California, he gave a short answer. "The weather."

"My wife, Gwen (deceased two years ago at the age of 92), and I moved to California 63 years ago, where after my military service, I became a carpenter, later becoming a contractor in construction," he said. "I still do repairs around the house; when I get older, I won't be able to do that."

Settannil said he and his wife of 72 years raised two sons (one died of a heart attack at age 38). The other son, Jay, lives in South County and is 68 years old. Stet-

tannil has six grandchildren and five great-grandchildren, with the oldest great-grandchild turning 21 in November.

"She's a model and has 3,000 friends on Facebook; that makes her a very popular model," said Settannil.

Settannil's military service was in the Army, where he served all over Europe during WWII, becoming a staff sergeant in the medical detachment over the Mortar Battalion.

"I was in the whole of the Europe Campaign until the Germans gave up in May 1945," Settannil said. "All of my comrades except one, who is 93, have passed on." May 8, 1945, both Great Britain and the United States celebrated victory in Europe. Cities in both nations, as well as formerly occupied cities in Western Europe, put out flags and banners, rejoicing in the defeat of the Nazi war machine. May 8 was the day when German troops throughout Europe finally laid down their guns. In Prague, Germans surrendered to the Soviets, after the Soviets lost more than 8,000 soldiers, and the Orange County News June 24, 2015 1 of 2


City lowers flags, cancels City Council meeting

'Next to Normal' is anything but ordinary

GG's Gem Theater puts on a stomping-good production

One More Productions proudly presents Brian Yorkey and Tom Kitt's Tony and Pulitzer prizewinning musical sensation, "Next to Normal" at the beautiful Gem Theatre on Main Street in the historic section of downtown Garden Grove.

Next to Normal doesn't boast elaborate costumes, feel-good foot stomping song and dance numbers, hum-along tunes, or grandeur set changes, so what makes a solid rock opera about an unhinged wife and mother struggling with a bipolar disorder so alluring?

Next to Normal is an emotionally poignant and brave musical that speaks to its audience without the frills or guarantees of a formula-driven hit, instead, it is raw, stripped down, and lives somewhere on the edge, and more or less, as the title implies, "Next to Normal." This ultra-

contemporary and revolutionary body of work is both emotionally jarring and exhilarating, and it holds one's heart hostage as the pain of what lies behind a dysfunctional or disturbed family's closed doors is often too real to ignore. Wally Huntoon's simplistic multileveled set design exemplifies the highs and lows, both figuratively and literally of the lives of Diana (Elyssa Alexander) and her fractured family.

Together with Jon Hyrkas' multi-faceted and richly saturated jewel-toned lighting design, the technical team has found the perfect balance, and the elements draw the main focus to the intensity of the characters as they propel themselves onto their individual and collective emotional roller coaster rides.

Under the musical direction of Damien Lorton, and featuring conductor Toni Helms on piano, Jeffrey Segal on drums, Kevin Homma on bass, Lois Good on violin, Chris McCarthy on cello, and Carlos Melgar on guitar, the "Seventh Star" of the show has got to be the extraordinary, compli-

Orange County News June 24, 2015 1 of 2 cated, and surging musical score, and with superb musicianship, One More Production's sextet soars with technical precision that brings the Next to Normal rock opera to its knees like a classic Rod Stewart or Mick Jagger concert caught in a time warp that you never want to recover from.

Alexander has the vocal chops to belt out the difficult score beautifully, and she also conveys a sincere sensitivity, warmth, and an honest understanding of a woman barely clinging to reality and realizing the agonizing pain, and yet, unbridled relief of slipping into the "safety net" of an unbalanced and disturbed mental state.


"Most people who think they're happy haven't thought about it enough. I don't feel like myself, I don't feel anything," exclaims Diana after shock treatment. "Patient stable," the doc scribbles in his notes.

Alex Bodrero admirably portrays Diana's long suffering husband, Dan, with the bravado of a devoted and loving partner who is emotionally thread-bare but never gives up on the idea of a happy marriage with a happily-ever-after family unit. His duet with Diana, "How Could I Ever Forget," is incredibly moving.

Kat Ljubic brings the couple's teenage daughter to life, and Ljubic could not be more convincing as Natalie. Another strong performance comes from Edgar Torrens as Dr. Madden. Although he is credible as Diana's shrink, his "Make Up Your Mind" number is a frenetic force, and his powerful rock star persona resonates with the audience loud and clear.

Brandon Taylor Jones portrays son, Gabe, and Jones breathes truth and legitimacy into his character while redefining the undeniable bond between parent and child.

Jonathan. Fierros also gives a vibrant performance as Natalie's 17-year-old lazy "stoner" boyfriend, Henry. Director Lorton makes this show what it is meant to be – an emotional purgation of realism and total madness that dare to meet somewhere beyond "normal."

Scott Stiles, the assistant city manager for Cincinnati, will be its next top executive, beginning Aug. 3. The City Council approved his appointment this month.

He will make \$256,000 a year until his contract expires in 2018. He is eligible for \$12,000 in relocation costs.

In a statement, Stiles called the chance to lead Garden Grove an "incredible opportunity."

"My family and I are thrilled to join such a diverse and progressive community," Stiles said of the city with 175,000 people that is approximately one-third each Vietnamese, Hispanic and white.

Stiles will replace interim city manager Allan Roeder, hired to temporarily take charge after former executive Matt Fertal retired on Jan. 1.

The city has experienced significant turnover among top-level staffers and City Council members since the fall. Former fire Chief David Barlag resigned; Bruce Broadwater lost his re-election bid in a tight race to current Mayor Bao Nguyen; former Councilwoman Dina Nguyen termed out and was replaced by Phat Bui, and Todd Elgin replaced now-retired Kevin Raney as police chief.

Stiles climbed the ranks of Cincinnati City Hall over the past 26 years; he served as its interim manager from December 2013 to September 2014.

"Scott's professional experience, passion for public service, and ethics make him a good fit for Garden Grove," said Mayor Bao Nguyen. "His sincere enthusiasm and eagerness to better serve our community will help us take our city forward."

New biography tells a war hero's story

GARDEN GROVE • Many in town already know the story: Holocaust survivor, war hero, prisoner of war, Medal of Honor recipient.

But now, the life of Garden Grove resident Tibor Rubin – from his experience as a preteen Hungarian Jew fleeing to Switzerland to escape the Nazis to a prisoner of war held by Chinese forces – has been written down for mass distribution.

"Single Handed: The Inspiring True Story of Tibor Teddy' Rubin – Holocaust Survivor, Korean War Hero and Medal of Honor Recipient" by Daniel M. Cohen was released last month.

The book recounts in 488 pages the life of the 86-year-old retired corporal, who survived a Nazi concentration camp and gave medical assistance to his fellow Korean War soldiers while imprisoned by the Chinese for two years.

"When I first met him in 2011, I thought his story was extraordinary," said Cohen, a Santa Monica writer who met Rubin through a rabbi. "I didn't know why no one

had written it yet."

Rubin spent much of his postwar life in anonymity, though his comrades from Korea and the prisoner of war camp petitioned the government for years that he deserved the country's highest military honor.

Since receiving the Medal of Hono" in 2005, he has received much official praise: a United States stamp with his likeness, a Garden Grove library named after him and a short Medal of Honor documentary by PBS.

Still, to Rubin's family, this book is an equally appreciated honor.

"I can't wait to read it," said Rubin's daughter, Rosie, who also cares for her mother and father.

here," says Amy Montoya, the store's manager. "She's tall, so she can reach everything. ... Customers love her. She's outgoing and her personality is easy to remember."

Singh grew up between households. Her parents, of Indian and Mexican descent, divorced early in her childhood.

She spent mornings at school and afternoons at home, studying and doing chores. She remembers loving cartoons, but having no other hobbies.

The summer before her junior year at Los Amigos High, a family friend began teaching Singh how to box.

"Her going through high school," recalled Joey Aguilar, Singh's longtime trainer, via email, "she had to give up a lot of social time with friends and family so that she had time to do her homework and focus on training."

A year after starting, she won her maiden tournament. She won the 2013 Adidas National PAL Tournament in Oxnard. Singh qualified for the 2014 USA Boxing National Championships in Spokane, Wash.

Members of past U.S. Olympic teams littered the field, but Singh advanced to her weight class' championship bout. A spot on the women's national team hung in the balance.

"I don't get nervous before fighting," she said. "I don't get scared. I get excited. I want to show everyone the hard work I put it."

Singh lost by unanimous

decision.

Later in the year, however, she repeated as champion at the 2014 Adidas Tournament. In October, Singh partially tore the medial collateral ligament in her left knee. She then aggravated the injury in January.

Her national light welterweight—ranking—dropped from No. 2 to No. 4.

Singh works at Starbucks five days a week to fund her amateur career. Other than the gear she receives courtesy of her only sponsor, Singh pays her way, balancing expenses such as airfare, gas, hotel rooms and food.

For weekly sparring ses-

sions Singh drives to Los Angeles, the Inland Empire and sometimes other states for opponents.

"Jasmine can find sparring anywhere, but she cannot find much sparring at her level," said Bernie Valenzuela, the owner of Crossroads Boxing Gym in Ontario, where Singh regularly spars.

It's hot inside Garden Grove Boxing.

Singh enters the gym, sets her bag of gear on the ring apron and begins stretching.

She starts shadow boxing, and then works the speed and heavy bags, concluding her session with a flurry.

"I'm extremely fast," she said. "I can counterpunch, but at the same time I can be aggressive when I need to. And I hit hard. I can put everything into one punch. I can throw a combo if I need to or I can lay back and see what's going to happen."

If Singh places in the top three at 132 pounds at the Pathway to the Podium qualifier, she'll earn a spot at October's U.S. Olympic Team Trials.



homemade *samosas*, puff pastry triangles filled with spicy potatoes.

"The fasting doesn't affect me at all," said Begum, a native of Bangladesh, "because my faith is so strong."

She said that during those 16 hours, those fasting don't eat or drink, not even water.

"You also don't swear or get angry," Begum said. "It is total purification of body and mind."

The word "Ramadan" in Arabic means "burning." And Begum, like her Muslim brothers and sisters, believes that the fasting and praying during the holy month helps incinerate their sins.


Adil Nyear of Garden Grove bit into a crisp samosa as he broke his fast a little after 8 p.m. Thursday.

"I've been fasting during Ramadan since I was 5," said Nyear, whose parents are from Pakistan. "In school, I played football and basketball, even as I kept the fast. It was not easy sometimes, but absolutely worth it."

Nyear also enjoys the fellowship at the mosque during Ramadan.

"We get together as a community every day to eat and pray, and that's so special," he said. "I really miss it when it's over."

Eleven-year-old Salman Atwat of Anaheim said that when he fasts during Ramadan, he feels constantly reminded of those less fortunate around the world who are forced go hungry and

thirsty every day.

"We're blessed to have so much," he said. "Many others are not so lucky."

"We have bonded for generations with each other," she said. "This is not just a mosque, it's home."

"Over the course of the past three years, DUI collisions have claimed nine lives and resulted in 144 injury crashes harming 211 of our friends and neighbors." said in locations based on collision Sgt. 



STUDY SESSION - REVIEW OF CONDITIONAL USE PERMITS AND ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE CONTROL (ABC) LICENSED ESTABLISHMENTS. Staff discussed and received input on Conditional Use Permits and Alcoholic Beverage Control (ABC) Licensed establishments.

MATTERS FROM COMMISSIONERS: Commissioner Margolin mentioned that more trash bags were seen at the old auto-sale alley. Staff stated they would look into the matter again.

Vice Chair Kanzler commended staff for their hard work and asked when the next General Plan Update would occur. Staff replied in the next five to ten years. Vice Chair Kanzler then mentioned that there was a push from the building industry for city water conservation ordinances.

The policy harm to California's urban renewal efforts, including infrastructure upgrades, brownfield remediation, transit oriented development, affordable housing and local economic development will linger for decades.

The dissolution process has been fraught with controversy. Applicable laws were drafted in a manner that, while there was a veneer of local input via oversight boards, all power was concentrated at the state Department of Finance (DOF) with no oversight of their decisions other than the courts.

AB 1484 (2012) gave additional enforcement powers and "sticks" to DOF, but legislators also requested and obtained several incentives or "carrots" that would be offered to local agencies that worked collaboratively with DOF to expedite the dissolution process. Those agencies that cooperated would be issued a DOF "finding of completion" and then be eligible to have loans previously issued by cities to their redevelopment agencies repaid at a reasonable interest rate reflective of what cities would have otherwise earned in the conservative Local Agency Investment Fund (LAIF) managed by the state Treasurer.

The provisions of AB 113 can be divided into three areas:

- Harmful: Reversing and constricting previous incentives and due process offered to
 cities. These include efforts to narrow the definition of "loans" to be repaid and reduce
 interest rates. Other provisions further insulate DOF decisions from review via an
 exemption from the Administrative Procedures Act and limiting local agencies' ability to
 pay for attorneys in Court. Besides moving the goal posts and changing the rules, these
 provisions cause the greatest harm to the interests of affected agencies, and are of most
 concern to the League.
- Helpful/Leverage: Offering changes to the dissolution laws to address unresolved issues
 such as allowing communities to access some proceeds of redevelopment bonds issued
 in 2011, and clarifying issues with special property tax rates approved by voters for
 pensions. The Administration at the May Revise added other special provisions that are
 not connected at all to redevelopment. These proposals are clearly helpful to the affected
 agencies, but are being leveraged against the harmful changes.
- Mild Simplification: Making mild changes to statute that in isolation would be noncontroversial and match up with the term "simplification."

The underlying frustration for many cities with these provisions is the effort to reduce existing incentives to cities in AB 1484 as a reward for expeditiously resolving issues and obtain a DOF "finding of completion." Now that many agencies have made the concessions necessary to obtain these findings, it is simply wrong to move the goalposts and change the rules. It is regrettable that this proposal is being presented to legislators in such a divisive format.

As of today, it appears that concerns raised by cities have caused many legislators to pause and question the proposal that has been put before them. Some have expressed concern about being asked to vote on provisions that would reverse existing laws and court decisions and cause further harm to their cities. The League continues to urge the Legislature to reject the harmful aspects of this proposal on cities, so that a more balanced and equitable proposal can be crafted.

Next Steps

This measure was not taken up on Friday, and it remains unclear what the next steps may be. The Administration is working hard to round up votes for the measure as is, but some Assembly members have been discussing the possibility of a working group to review the measure and propose revisions. The League will keep its members informed on any future developments.

The adoption of the FY 2015-16 state budget got off to a slow start on Monday when the Legislature adopted just five of the 19 budget bills. Then on Tuesday came the announcement that Gov. Jerry Brown and the Democratic leadership of the Legislature had come to an agreement for the final package. While some issues of importance to cities — including redevelopment dissolution, Cap-and-Trade, and transportation funding — remain unresolved, cities fare well in the package adopted today.

Of note, the package passed today adopts a compromise on the local law enforcement grants. Monday's budget bill contained a legislative alternative that reduced the level of funding available for these grants and funding only special programs. But the final agreement will fund \$20 million for local law enforcement grants, provided the cities report data regarding use of force resulting in hospitalization or death. In addition, \$6 million will be awarded to local law enforcement agencies in community grants to improve community relations.

The budget package also includes appropriations from Proposition 1 in response to the drought. The budget begins the first of a three-year funding plan to appropriate \$1.8 billion Prop. 1 funds. Major funding is allocated to stormwater management, contaminated groundwater cleanup, groundwater management plans, water recycling, public water system infrastructure, and desalination.

The FY 2014-15 budget agreement provides continuous funding for 60 percent of Cap-and-Trade auction revenues, with the remaining 40 percent to be used for annual appropriations reflecting the priorities of the Legislature. There continues to be significant disagreement between the Governor, Assembly, and Senate on the use of that 40 percent, and negotiations continue. Favorably, the budget does not make any changes to the agreement from FY 2014-15 that provides for continuous appropriations of 60 percent of Cap-and-Trade auction revenues for affordable housing, transportation, transit, and high speed rail. As a result, these programs will continue to be funded.

While not directly a result of this budget package, cities will soon receive reimbursement for costs incurred in complying with state unfunded mandates prior to 2004. The FY 2014-15 budget agreement provides that, should the May Revision determine that state general fund revenues exceed estimates, additional reimbursement for pre-2004 mandate costs owed to cities counties and special districts are to be made. The May Revision determined that sufficient additional revenues have been received that the entire remaining balance of reimbursements owed may be paid, about \$765 million including interest.

The Department of Finance (DOF) has issued an <u>executive order</u> to the State Controller's Office (SCO) for these payments. DOF and SCO expect that payment for principle owed will be made by June 22. DOF has estimated the amount of interest owed for each agency as well but the SCO must verify these amounts prior to payment, expected by September 2015.

Unfortunately, not all the news is entirely positive. Several weeks ago the Governor's office began circulating budget trailer language that would allow the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) to order the consolidation of public water systems or a state small water systems within a disadvantaged community that consistently fail to provide an adequate supply of safe drinking water. While the League strongly supports ensuring that all Californians have access to safe drinking water, the budget trailer bill does not provide the resources needed to support the consolidated water system, thus opening the door to Prop. 218 challenges.

Details on these and other issues are included in the list of budget and trailer bills below. The bills will now go to the Governor for action by July 1.

Budget and Trailer Bills

Summaries below include points that may be the most interesting to cities from the bills adopted today. For more details, bill language can be found at www.cacities.org/billsearch.

AB 93 (Weber) - Main Budget Bill and SB 97 (Committee on Budget and Fiscal Review)

Together, these two bills represent the main FY 2015-16 budget. AB 93, the budget bill was passed Monday, and AB 123 makes changes to AB 93 to conform with the agreement between the Governor and Legislature. The bills include appropriations for the items discussed in the budget bills below as well as the following items:

- \$20 million for local law enforcement grants to city police departments. This is down from \$40 million last year and comes with new transparency requirements regarding use of force resulting in hospitalization or death;
- \$6 million will be awarded to local law enforcement agencies in competitive grants for community relations;
- \$8 million in competitive grants to local governments to reduce community recidivism rates:
- \$1.5 million for the California Library Services Act, which creates networks that act together on lending policies, bulk purchases and joint training programs;
- \$5.8 million for California Library Literacy Services, \$1 million of which is for the Career Online High School Program;
- \$4 million for Library Broadband Services;
- Requires Caltrans to streamline the cooperative work agreement process related to project initiations document development and oversight to reduce costs to local agencies;
- Provides additional funding to reduce the timeframe for the Road Usage Charge Pilot Program.
- \$125 million for the Active Transportation Program; and
- \$2.5 million for grants to local governments for boating safety and law enforcement through the Department of Parks and Recreation.

SB 75 (Committee on Budget and Fiscal Review) - Health

Makes various changes related to health including:

- Provides Medi-Cal coverage to eligible children regardless of immigration status; and
- Allows the Department of Public Health to purchase syringes and related supplies for syringe exchange programs.

AB 104 (Committee on Budget) - Education Omnibus Trailer Bill

Makes various changes and appropriations to child care, early childhood education, and K-14 education.

SB 78 (Committee on Budget and Fiscal Review) – Education Finance: Local Control Funding Formula

Repeals and revises sections of law made obsolete by the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), which replaces the prior revenue limit and categorical funding structure for K-12 education finance. Also includes appropriations necessary for purposes of the LCFF.

SB 79 (Committee on Budget and Fiscal Review) – Human Services

Makes various changes to programs and operations within the Department of Social Services including:

- Increasing the frequency of inspections to community care facilities, residential care facilities for the elderly, child day care centers, and family day care homes; and
- Allows counties to continue to provide housing supports to a person who has been discontinued from CalWORKS due to income eligibility requirements.

SB 80 (Committee on Budget and Fiscal Review) - Earned Income Tax Credit

Creates a state Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC), similar to the federal program. The state EITC will focus on households with incomes less than \$6,580 if there are no dependents and up to \$13,870 if there are three or more dependents.

SB 81 (Committee on Budget and Fiscal Review) - Postsecondary Education: Budget

Makes various changes to higher education including changes to CalGrants, the Middle Class Scholarship Program, community colleges, University of California and the California State University budgets.

SB 82 (Committee on Budget and Fiscal Review) – Developmental Services

Makes various changes to developmental services, including regional centers, secured facilities, out-of-state placements, and performance objectives.

SB 83 (Committee on Budget and Fiscal Review) - Public Resources

- Establishes the Assistant Director for Environmental Justice in the California Environmental Protection Agency;
- Authorizes money in the Enhanced Fleet Modernization Subaccount to be available to the State Air Resources Board to implement and administer the enhanced fleet modernization program;
- Requires, on or after July 1, 2016, the SWRCB to adopt a fee schedule to be paid annually by each public water system to cover the board's drinking water program and enforcement costs;
- Requires the Division of Oil, Gas, and Geothermal Resources consult with the SWRCB and appropriate regional water quality boards regarding underground injection control;
- Establishes the Border Region Solid Waste Working Group to develop and coordinate long-term solutions to address the waste tire, solid waste, and excessive sedimentation along the California Mexico border;
- Allocates \$10 million from the funds reverted to the California Clean Water, Clean Air, Safe Neighborhood Parks, and Coastal Protection Act of 2002 for local assistance programs, specifically outdoor education programs;
- Allows the State Fire Marshall to contract with a federally permitted hauler for disposal or storage of illegal and dangerous fireworks; and
- Allows the Department of Toxic Substances Control to regulate and enforce actions related to metal recycling facilities.

SB 84 (Committee on Budget and Fiscal Review) - State Government

- Changes reporting requirements for local agencies regarding the certified access specialist program (CASp). Local agencies will now report only to the Division of the State Architect rather than to the Legislature. In addition, local agencies will now have to report on activities undertaken to increase CASp services and to facilitate compliance.
- Requires the Office of Emergency Services (OES) coordinate with response and recovery operations in each mutual aid region, and to develop and adopt a state fire service and rescue emergency mutual aid plan that would be an annex to the State Emergency Plan.
- Creates the Regional Railroad Accident Preparedness and Immediate Response Force within the OES to provide regional and onsite response capabilities for hazardous materials spills from railcars or accidents that involve railcars. Requires the Director of Emergency Services to set a fee schedule for the shipment of extremely hazardous materials by rail.
- Creates the Human Trafficking Victims Assistance Fund within the OES. The fund would provide grants to nonprofit organizations to provide services to victims of human trafficking.
- Requires the DOF, Secretary of State, and Legislative Analyst's Office to convene a workgroup to evaluate alternatives for funding elections-related state mandates.
- Establishes a position within the Governor's Office of Planning and Research to develop
 a report on programs and services that serve immigrants. The report is due no later than
 Jan.1, 2016, and then would be used to create an online clearinghouse of available
 services. The position would also monitor the implementation of statewide laws and
 regulations that serve immigrants.

- Authorizes the Department of Housing and Community Development to provide temporary assistance to people moving out of a housing unit due to a lack of potable water in connection with the drought.
- Allows the rental of the Office of Migrant Services centers to people who are homeless in connection with the drought.
- Recognizes that existence of the California Residential Mitigation Program (CRPM), an
 existing JPA, and allows the CRPM to provide grants and loans to residential property
 owners for seismic retrofit work. Excludes amounts received from an individual's gross
 income for tax purposes.
- Requires Cal-OSHA to prioritize accidents involving death or serious injury over nonserious violations.
- Suspends the fee for the annual and biennial inspections of conveyances by the Division
 of Occupational Safety and Health for the FY 2015-16. Allows the suspension to continue
 to reduce the balance of the Elevator Safety Account.
- Requires the Franchise Tax Board to collect unpaid tolls, toll evasion penalties, and related fees as if they were taxes.
- Makes various technical changes to the Prepaid Mobile Telephony Service Surcharge Collection Act, which was implemented this year. Among other things, the bill exempts sellers with less than \$15,000 in related sales from the requirements to collect the taxes and fees
- Makes various other changes to state programs.
- Includes cleanup language for SB 556 (2014) regarding contractors vehicle and uniform logo requirements.
- Allows for a retired person to serve as an elected official without reinstatement or interruption of their pension benefits.

SB 85 (Committee on Budget and Fiscal Review) - Public Safety

Amnesty Program: Fines and Bail: Requires counties to establish an amnesty program for fines and bail due and payable on or before Jan. 1, 2013, similar to the program required under existing law for fines and bail for infractions or misdemeanor violations of the Penal Code and Vehicle Code due and payable on or before Jan. 1, 2009.

- The program would accept payments of 50 percent the total amount due between Oct. 1, 2015 and March 31, 2017.
- Participants can receive an additional reduction if they certify under penalty of perjury that they receive public assistance, or that their monthly income is 125 percent or less of current poverty guidelines.

California Highway Patrol (<u>CHP</u>) <u>Body Camera Program</u>: Requires the CHP to develop a plan for implementing a body-worn camera pilot program by Jan. 1, 2016.

- Specifies components of the plan, including but not limited to:
 - o Types of officers assigned to wear a body camera;
 - Minimum specifications for the cameras:
 - Best practices for notifying members of the public of active recording:
 - Best practices for data storage; and
 - A schedule for reviewing body-worn camera policies and protocols.

Supplemental Law Enforcement Services Account (<u>SLESA</u>) Funding: Continues payments of \$100,000 to each local law enforcement jurisdiction under SLESA.

<u>California Community Incentive Grant Program:</u> Specifies schedule of incentive payments to counties for not returning offenders to prison under the California Community Incentive Grant Program.

<u>Recidivism Reduction Fund:</u> Removes the sunset from the Recidivism Reduction Fund, and deletes language providing for reversion to the state General Fund one year after allocation of unencumbered monies not dedicated to a community recidivism and crime reduction service provider.

SB 88 (Committee on Budget and Fiscal Review) - Water

- Authorizes the SWRCB to order consolidation with a receiving water system where a
 public water system, or a state small water system within a disadvantaged community,
 consistently fails to provide an adequate supply of safe drinking water. Requires, the
 SWRCB, prior to ordering consolidation or extension of service, to conduct an initial
 public meeting and a public hearing. Limits the liability of a consolidated water system,
 wholesaler, or any other agency in the chain of distribution that delivers water to a
 consolidated water system.
- Exempts from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) certain groundwater replenishment projects until Jan. 1, 2017.
- Exempt from CEQA the development and approval of building standards by state agencies for recycled water systems until July 1, 2017.
- Exempt from CEQA the adoption of an ordinance to impose stricter conditions on the issuance of well permits or changes in the intensity of land use that would increase demand on groundwater until July 1, 2017.
- Requires, commencing Jan. 1, 2016, a person who diverts 10 acre-feet of water per year
 or more under a permit or license to install and maintain a device or employ a method
 capable of measuring the rate of direct diversion, rate of collection to storage, and rate of
 withdrawal or release from storage.
- Expand this civil liability to any violation of any regulation adopted by the SWRCB.
- Provide that a court or public entity may hold a person civilly liable in an amount not to exceed \$10,000 for a violation of a water conservation program ordinance or resolution, or certain emergency regulations adopted by the SWRCB. Prohibit the civil liability assessed by a court or public entity for the first violation by a residential water user from exceeding \$1,000.
- Require the secretary to post information on the Natural Resources Agency's website on changes to project timelines and project spending, in order to facilitate oversight of Prop. 1 funding and projects.
- Appropriates \$10 million to the CalConserve Water Use Efficiency Revolving Fund for loans for water use efficiency projects. Local agencies may receive at or below market interest rate loans.

AB 117 (Committee on Budget) - Public Resources

Extends the CEQA streamlining process in the Jobs and Economic Improvement through Environmental Leadership Act of 2011 from Jan. 1, 2016 to Jan. 1, 2017.

SB 98 (Committee on Budget and Fiscal Review) – State Government: Employee Retirement

Implements the Governor's proposal to start having the retiree health care system prefunded, similar to that of pensions. Applies only to state employees.

California City Solutions: Santa Maria's Code Compliance Officers Walk and Talk with Residents

This story is part of an ongoing series featuring Helen Putnam Award entries. The 2014 entries are available on the League's website as a resource for cities in a searchable database called <u>California City Solutions</u>. Santa Maria's Walk and Talk program was submitted in 2014 for the Enhancing Public Trust, Ethics, and Community Involvement award category.

In an effort to educate Santa Maria residents about the city's municipal codes, the city in 2013 launched its Walk and Talk program to send code compliance officers door-to-door to meet residents and share code compliance resources.

There is no shortage of work for the city of Santa Maria's four code compliance officers and their supervisor, who serve more than 100,000 residents in dozens of neighborhoods across the city's 23 square miles. Many new and younger residents were unaware of the local rules designed to improve the quality of life in their community. With the city's resources and budget stretched thin there was an unlikely chance of hiring any new officer positions. The city created the Walk and Talk program after the town hall meetings as a proactive approach to this challenge.

Like their colleagues in many communities, Santa Maria's small code compliance team has limited resources and no budget for outreach or marketing, yet the number of complaints is consistently high. Common code violations include vehicles parked on lawns, illegal garage conversions, unpermitted yard and garage sales, and livestock residing in an urban setting.

Previous strategies to inform residents about code violations included inserts in city utility bills, information on the city's website, and to working with the local media to spread the word. Additionally, the city also hosted an information booth at city events to speak with residents about quality of life issues in neighborhoods.

In January 2013, the Code Compliance team, within the City Attorney's Office, developed the Walk and Talk program. Through its monthly Walk and Talk program, the Code Compliance Division staff directly meets with and educates residents in neighborhoods about quality of life issues and applicable municipal code that apply to their properties. Citations are only issued if officials discover a dangerous or very serious violation while visiting.

Code compliance officers are dedicated to providing superior service to the community. They must be customer service oriented. The nature of their work requires them to be firm, fair, and consistent in carrying out their enforcement duties. Among their goals is to develop a collaborative effort with residents.

By meeting residents on their doorsteps in a friendly, educational manner, the code compliance officers and police officers foster trust and openness, encouraging open discussion regarding neighborhood quality of life issues. The officers distribute flyers in English and Spanish that

explain the most common municipal code violations in a nonthreatening manner. Residents have the opportunity to share what is going on in their neighborhood so the city can follow up and address their concerns.

The program is designed to encourage development of management skills among code compliance officers as a means of team building and for succession planning. Each month's Walk and Talk is organized by a different officer who is responsible for researching the targeted neighborhood, preparing pamphlets, scheduling the event, hosting a pre-walk meeting to address known risks, assigning officers to specific addresses and blocks and more.

The Walk and Talks geographically cover the entire city during a three to four year period, with properties mapped after each visit. Upon returning from the Walk and Talk, the officers are required to write a summary report for the supervisor and city attorney.

The officers also keep an eye out for special property nuisance projects, which are referred to "Serve Santa Maria," a group of volunteers who perform community service projects twice a year. Serve Santa Maria projects range from painting houses, repairing fences, trimming trees, and hauling debris to assist residents who have difficulty complying with the codes because of the lack of funds to perform this maintenance themselves.

In the first approximately 15 months of the program, the team visited more than 2,000 residences and spoke with about 5,000 occupants. The city is not only observing a significant reduction in the number of visible code compliance violations, but is finding that residents have been sharing information with family and friends in areas that have not already been covered. Additionally, after being provided information on common code violations, many residents are taking it upon themselves or informing their neighbors to correct their own violations.

The city reports that Walk and Talk is making a difference and staff has noticed that residents are more receptive to visits and are willing to engage in face-to-face discussions with officers. The program is adaptable to cover hot topics and trends. For example, complaints about illegal yard sale signs increase during spring months. The team distributes flyers highlighting resources for these trends and displaying city hotlines to report broken streetlights, dumped trash, abandoned shopping carts, graffiti, animal services, city utilities and other information.

The City Attorney's Office has received dozens of telephone calls from residents who wanted to express their appreciation for the code compliance officers who were out in their neighborhood.

At the mayor's direction, the program soon will add an outreach component to address commercial signage and aesthetics for merchants along the city's main downtown corridors. The Community Development Department ensured that three planners were available for this Walk and Talk, with the goal of assisting businesses to be successful.

There is ongoing collaboration with local media to build awareness of key quality of life issues. The Walk and Talk program has received coverage from the local daily and weekly newspapers, all three local TV stations, radio stations, and the local Spanish language TV station. Univision.

The recommendations will then be submitted to the League board for approval when it meets on Thursday, Oct. 1, during annual conference. Candidates receiving the board's endorsement will be annual conference. 2 during the closing session of the annual conference.

U.S. Supreme Court's Sign Case May Require Altering Sign Codes Nationwide Webinar Will be Held in the Future to Provide More Details

In <u>Reed v. Town of Gilbert</u> the U.S. Supreme Court held unanimously that Gilbert's Sign Code, which treats various categories of signs differently based on the information they convey, violates the First Amendment. The State and Local Legal Center (SLLC) filed an <u>amicus brief</u> in this case arguing that Reed's argument, if adopted by the Court, will render sign codes unconstitutional nationwide.

Gilbert's Sign Code treats temporary directional signs less favorably (in terms of size, location, duration, etc.) than political signs and ideological signs. Content-based laws are only constitutional if they pass strict scrutiny — that is, if they are narrowly tailored to serve a compelling government interest.

While the SLLC argued in its amicus brief that the sign categories in this case are based on function, the Court concluded they are based on content. The various categories draw distinctions based on the message a speaker conveys. So under Gilbert's sign code: "[i]f a sign informs its reader of the time and place a book club will discuss John Locke's Two Treatises of Government, that sign will be treated differently from a sign expressing the view that one should vote for one of Locke's followers in an upcoming election, and both signs will be treated differently from a sign expressing an ideological view rooted in Locke's theory of government."

Gilbert's Sign Code failed strict scrutiny because its two asserted compelling interests — preserving aesthetic and traffic safety — were "hopelessly underinclusive." Temporary directional signs are "no greater an eyesore" and pose no greater threat to public safety than ideological or political signs.

Many, if not most communities, like Gilbert, regulate some categories of signs in a way the Supreme Court has defined as content-based in this opinion. Communities will need to change these ordinances.

Justice Alito, in a concurring opinion, offers a list of rules that he and two other Justices believes would not be content-based.

Justice Kagan, in a separate concurring opinion joined by two other Justices, is less optimistic about the impact of this ruling on local government: "As the years go by, courts will discover that thousands of towns have ordinances [that contain subject matter exemptions like historical markers] many of them 'entirely reasonable.' And as the challenges to them mount, courts will have to invalidate one after the other. (This Court may soon find itself a veritable Supreme Board of Sign Review.) And courts will strike down those democratically enacted local laws even though no one — certainly not the majority — has ever explained why the vindication of First Amendment values requires that result."

The Los Angeles Municipal Code requires hotel operators to maintain certain registration records regarding their guests, including their names and addresses as well as vehicle and payment information. The Code also requires those records to "be made available to any officer of the Los Angeles Police Department for inspection," and that failure to do so on request is a misdemeanor.

A group of hotel operators brought suit challenging the inspection requirement, arguing it violates their rights under the Fourth Amendment to be free from unreasonable search and seizure.

The U.S. Supreme Court agreed, in a 5-4 opinion authored by Justice Sotomayor. The Court found the inspection requirement is unconstitutional on its face because it subjects the hotel operators to punishment for failing to comply with an inspection demand without affording them an opportunity to obtain pre-compliance review by a neutral decision-maker.

The Court rejected the contention that facial challenges are not available, or are disfavored, under the Fourth Amendment. The Court also rejected the notion that the ruling would impede law enforcement efforts to deter criminals from using hotels to engage in illicit activities such as drug dealing, prostitution, and human trafficking. The League's amicus brief in the case had emphasized that point, in support of the Los Angeles ordinance at issue.

Characterizing its holding as "narrow," the Court explained that an inspection would not violate the U.S. Constitution if performed pursuant to an administrative subpoena, which would afford a hotel operator an opportunity to object to police review of its records. The decision further explained that an inspection would not violate the U.S. Constitution where another exception to the warrant requirement applies — such as where a hotel operator consents to a search or where exigent circumstances make law enforcement's needs so compelling that the failure to obtain a warrant is justified.

In light of the ruling, police departments should consult with their city attorneys to ensure that any local ordinance providing for inspection of hotel guest records withstands constitutional scrutiny and remains enforceable.

Just over a year ago Gov. Jerry Brown and the Legislature dedicated 20 percent of Cap-and-Trade auction revenues to the AHSC program. The program provides grants or loans to projects intended to achieve greenhouse gas reductions (GHG) through increasing accessibility of affordable housing, employment centers and key destinations via low-carbon transportation options, like walking, biking and transit, which result in fewer vehicle miles traveled.

According to SGC, the 28 recommended projects will provide over 2,000 new affordable housing units and reduce an estimated 723,286 metric tons of GHG emissions — the equivalent of taking 140,483 cars off the road for one year.

Once the first round of funding is awarded, the SGC will turn to reviewing the program guidelines for the second round of funding. SCG has scheduled two workshops for staff to hear from applicants about the process from their perspective, discuss lessons learned and to provide cities an opportunity to suggest changes before the next round of funding. Resolution Submission Process

Any elected or appointed city official, individual city, division, department, policy committee, or the board of directors may submit a resolution for consideration at the conference. Resolutions must be submitted to the League's Sacramento office no later than 60 days prior to the opening of the conference. Resolutions should focus on direct municipal issues of statewide importance.

Resolutions submitted to the General Assembly must provide written documentation of concurrence by five cities or by city officials from at least five or more cities. This may be in the form of a letter from the city or the city official in support. For concurrence by a city official, the official's city and office held must be included in the letter. All concurrences must be submitted at the time the resolution is submitted by midnight, Aug. 1.

Consideration at Annual Conference

The League President refers resolutions to the League policy committees for review and recommendation at the conference. Resolutions are next considered by the General Resolutions Committee (GRC), which consists of representatives from each division, department, policy committee and individuals appointed by the League President. Resolutions approved by the policy committee and/or GRC are next considered by General Assembly. Resolutions disapproved or referred by both the policy committee and GRC will not proceed to the General Assembly. Resolutions approved by the General Assembly become League policy. Other action on resolutions can be: referred back to a policy committee; amended; disapproved; or, no action.

Late-Breaking Issues

Resolutions to address late-breaking issues may be introduced by petition at the Annual Conference. To qualify, a petitioned resolution must be signed by 10 percent of the voting delegates and submitted at least 24 hours before the beginning of the Concluding General Assembly. The deadline is Oct. 1 by noon. All qualified petitioned resolutions are forwarded to the General Assembly for consideration, regardless of the action recommended by the GRC.
