Enclosed is the February 2020 Investment Report which shows the financial institutions, types of investment instruments, monthly transactions, current month interest received, and the par and fair market value of investments held. The month-end cash in the bank and petty cash balances are also listed on the Cash and Investment Report. The pie chart (please see chart on attachment A) reflects the investment instruments as a percentage of the total portfolio.

This investment portfolio meets State guidelines and adheres to the City's investment policy. As of February 2020, the City's total portfolio is invested in:

The cash with fiscal agents is restricted as they are funds held and invested by an outside fiscal agent. The restrictions were set forth in the related bond indentures. As of February 2020, 2.806% of the portfolio is restricted.



ORANGE COUNTY HEALTH OFFICER ISSUES FACE COVERING RECOMMENDATION FOR ESSENTIAL BUSINESSES

County of Orange Health Officer Dr. Nichole Quick today issued a recommendation strongly encouraging all employees at essential businesses to wear a face covering while at work and all residents engaged in essential activities outside the home to do the same.

The recommendation is in line with guidance issued by the California Department of Public Health on April 1, and is intended to help slow the spread of COVID-19 by those who are asymptomatic.

"Residents can make their own face coverings at home from a variety of materials and should refrain from purchasing personal protective equipment that is critical and in short supply for our healthcare workers, such as N95 and surgical masks," said Dr. Quick.

A face covering is material that covers the nose and mouth. It can be secured to the head with ties or straps, or simply wrapped around the lower face. Face coverings may be factory-made, as well as folded or sewn, and can be improvised using household items like scarfs, T-shirts, sweatshirts or towels.

"Face coverings are an additional tool that may help protect staff and patrons from COVID-19, but they are not a substitute for proven protective measures like frequent hand washing, keeping your hands away from your face, practicing social distancing and staying home," said Dr. Quick.

In addition, effective immediately, all essential businesses as identified by the State of California (list available at www.covid19.ca.gov/img/EssentialCriticalInfrastructureWorkers.pdf) should maintain a healthy work environment as recommended by CDC's Interim Guidance for Businesses and Employers to Plan and Respond to Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) at www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/community/guidance-business-response.html.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE ORANGE COUNTY HEALTH OFFICER [ISSUED 4/8/2020]

- WHEREAS, Executive Order N-33-20 issued by the Governor of State of California
 ("Executive Order") (available at https://covid19.ca.gov/img/Executive-Order-N-33-20.pdf) ordered all individuals living in the State of California to stay home or at their place of residence, except as needed to maintain the continuity of operations of sectors designated in the document available at
 https://covid19.ca.gov/img/EssentialCriticalInfrastructureWorkers.pdf as updated by the State Public Health Officer ("Essential Workers").
- WHEREAS, the State of California has published at https://covid19.ca.gov/stay-home-except-for-essential-needs/ those permissive activities that the general public may engage in while staying home or at their place of residence, such as taking a walk around one's neighborhood, etc., ("Allowed Activities").
- 3. WHEREAS, California Department of Public Health issued a Face Coverings Guidance ("Guidance") on April 1, 2020 (attached hereto as Exhibit A).
- 4. WHEREAS, the Guidance provides that a face covering is a material that covers the nose and mouth; it can be secured to the head with ties or straps or simply wrapped around the lower face; it can be made of a variety of materials, such as cotton, silk, or linen; and a face covering may be factory-made or sewn by hand, or can be improvised from household items such as scarfs, T-shirts, sweatshirts, or towels.

Pursuant to California Health and Safety Code sections 101040 and 120175, the Orange County Health Officer STRONGLY RECOMMENDS:

- 5. Effective immediately, all Essential Workers should wear a face covering while at work when interacting with the public or co-workers. In addition, all Orange County residents should wear a face covering when outside the home engaged in Allowed Activities. However, due to the scarcity of critical medical supplies, N95 respirators and surgical masks should not be used except by workers in healthcare and first responder settings.
- 6. Effective immediately, all entities necessary for maintaining the continuity of operations of the federal critical infrastructure sectors, as identified at https://covid19.ca.gov/img/EssentialCriticalInfrastructureWorkers.pdf, should maintain a healthy work environment as recommended by CDC's Interim Guidance for Businesses and Employers to Plan and Respond to Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) at

https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/community/guidance-business-response.html.

General Provisions

- 7. These Recommendations are necessary to protect and preserve the public health from, and prevent, the increasing transmission of COVID-19 in California and the County.
- 8. All County residents are encouraged to continue practicing 6-feet social distancing and to utilize frequent handwashing. Wearing a face covering is not a substitute for these practices that are critical to slowing the increased transmission of COVID-19.
- 9. These Recommendations shall not supersede any conflicting or more restrictive orders issued by the State of California or Federal governments.

As this is a rapidly evolving situation, these Recommendations may be revised at any time.

Property Tax Deadline is Friday, April 10, Penalty Cancellation Requests can be Filed after April 10

Stay Home, Stay Safe, Pay Online

SANTA ANA – State law governs when property taxes are due and payable, and Treasurer-Tax Collector (Treasurer) is not authorized to change the April 10 deadline. We suggest that you "Stay Home, Stay Safe and Pay Online" using our **no cost** eCheck (bank account) payment option that provides same day credit and an emailed or printed receipt at ocgov.com/octaxbill, and is secure once you get to the third party payment page.

Other 24/7 ways to make timely payment by midnight on April 10:

714 834-3411 by credit/debit card (2.29 percent service fee)

"I understand and sympathize with the financial impacts that COVID-19 may have had on our taxpayers," states Treasurer Freidenrich. "I also understand that the upcoming property tax payment may be one of the largest single expenditures that taxpayers make each year." Property taxes fund critical local government services, including those services needed during this emergency, and we encourage taxpayers to pay by April 10 if they can.

After April 10, if the taxpayer is a homeowner, small business or other property owner with significant demonstrated economic hardship due to COVID-19 or believe that they qualify for one of the other limited exceptions and can't pay by April 10, then as soon as the taxpayer is able to pay, they should request a <u>Penalty Cancellation</u>. All requests will be reviewed on a case-by-case basis. Taxpayers will need to complete and sign the form, include a check for the base property tax amount due (without penalties or costs), provide third party documentation justifying the request and mail these items to the address on the form. We appreciate the Governor's support that County Treasurers have existing authority by law to assist these significantly impacted taxpayers in this time of need.

The County has added a website for COVID-19 information at <u>COVID19info.ocgov.com</u> and a County phone number, (714) 480-6500, has been established to help local businesses navigate the current economic climate with loans that could help pay property taxes.

CREATE A FAMILY PLAN DURING COVID-19

The County of Orange is encouraging residents to create a family preparedness plan in the event they are impacted by COVID-19. Family preparedness is a mainstay of planning for emergencies such as earthquakes and fires, and they are equally important during a health pandemic.

Parents and caregivers are encouraged to reach out to trusted family, friends or neighbors who may be able to assist, should a child's parent or caregiver be diagnosed with COVID-19 and require hospitalization and/or isolation.

"We want families to be ready in the event a caregiver unexpectedly is diagnosed with COVID-19," said Debra Baetz, Director of Orange County Social Services Agency. "By taking some simple steps, families can help alleviate the stress of an unforeseen health emergency and ensure their loved ones are cared for."

Here are some important things to consider when putting together a family plan:

- Create an alternate caregiver list: Set up a roster of trusted adults who can step in to provide childcare, being mindful of the unique circumstances surrounding COVID-19. Choose individuals who are not high-risk and who would be able to accommodate an isolation area, should your child need it. Discuss the plan ahead of time with these individuals.
- **Prepare documents:** Write a letter authorizing your designated caregiver to seek medical treatment for your child, if necessary. Make copies of insurance cards and other important medical documents your alternate caregiver may need.
- Write down special instructions: Be sure to leave a "need-to-know" list for your alternate caregiver. This list may include information such as food allergies, needed medication, nutritional needs or limitations, or any other habit or routine that may help provide consistency of care to your loved one.
- Create a kid-friendly "go bag": Being separated from a parent or loved one can cause stress and anxiety for your children. Pack a bag with some overnight

Garden Grove teacher races to fill coronavirus face shield shortage

The battle against the novel coronavirus has exposed huge gaps in supply chains and shown us how these shortfalls are being filled with old-fashion ingenuity and volunteerism.


The shortage of medical protective gear has focused mainly on basic face masks because they're in demand by the public, too. Companies and individuals alike have pitched in to fill this supply void with simple, fabric masks.

But face shields, devices that create a plastic barrier between medical providers and patients, also are in short supply. News reports that doctors and nurses didn't have this key protection motivated Eric Henninger, a Garden Grove High School computer science teacher, to get to work.

The 42-year-old was feel-ing bummed about the virus-related shutdown of schools. The closing took him away from his job as well as his post as the school's swim and water polo coach. He wanted to fill his empty time doing something good.

Turning mind to 'something positive'

Henninger admits he was "bored and sad for the loss of the (swim team's) seniors' season. This got my mind on something posi-

those with clear sheets of he couldn't make more fast enough.

Turning his home into a factory

Henninger's home in Orange has become part fac-tory — with 10 3D printers 11-year-old son are being

His labor of love started two weeks ago and has pro-duced and delivered more than 600 shields to Southern California medical workers at institutions such as Children's Hospital of Orange County, Kaiser Permanente and St. Mary's Memorial. He still has 2,000 on back order.

So now Henninger is




spitting out shield frames at a slow rate of one an hour. He's thankful his wife and supportive.

via his oc3dppe.org website. His top priority is finding people with idle 3D printers. He's willing to train those willing to join his shield brigade. Less techsavvy people can help, too, by hole-punching plastic sheets or helping move materials and delivering finished shields.


Filling in some corona-

seeking volunteers to help virus cracks isn't easy, he admits, saying he's feeling mostly positive knowing I'm helping people, but extremely stressed.

Are takeout and delivery from restaurants safe right now?

AWell, food sales are considered essential services, and that's really one of the few reasons anyone should be leaving his house during this crisis. We just have to be vigilant.

I recently ran to the grocery store to grab a few basics, and I encountered 20 times as many people (staff and fellow customers) in a single visit than I have in two weeks' worth of restaurant pickups.

I encounter minimal human contact when getting delivery/takeout. So which is safer? The latter seems to me to meet the definition of social distancing much better than the occasional trip to the grocery store.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention says there's no evidence to suggest the coronavirus is transmitted through food. It is generally spread through respiratory droplets and on hard surfaces.


My colleague, Fielding Buck, recently wrote about how delivery services are offering contactless home delivery. And most of the restaurants where I have gone for takeout also have systems in place that let you pay and tip by credit card over the phone, with no need to sign anything when you arrive.

Plus when you get there, they either have curbside pickup or else they have the front door propped open so that nobody has to touch the door handles or get to close to anyone.

Whenever I go out to get food from a restaurant, I order enough to last several days rather than just a single meal.

Anyone can be a vector, though, and everyone should assume he is So I always wear gloves and a mask, and when I get home I wipe the containers before transferring the food to my own plates. I can't begin to count how many times a day I wash my hands.

Eat well. But do whatever you can to keep yourself and others safe. We will get through this. OC Register

You've just lost your job? Here's what you need to know

Nearly 10 million Americans have lost their jobs and applied for unemployment benefits in the past two weeks — a stunning record high that reflects the nearly complete shutdown of the U.S. economy.

Job losses related to the coro-

Job losses related to the coronavirus are sure to rise further in coming weeks, with economists saying the U.S. unemployment rate could reach as high as 15%, well above the 10% peak during the Great Recession. As recently as February, the unemployment rate was just 3.5%, a 50-year low.

For those who have suddenly lost jobs, it's a frightening time. Bill need to be paid. Do they qualify for unemployment benefits? How fast will the money arrive?

Here are some questions and answers:

How can i get unemployment benefits?

Workers who have lost their jobs or income through no fault of their own should immediately file a claim for unemployment aid through their state labor departments. The benefit program is administered by state agencies. Most states are encouraging people to request benefits online or, if necessary, over the phone.

I've heard the system is overwhelmed by requests.

Yes, some state websites have crashed. Phone lines have been jammed as the number of people seeking jobless aid has far surpassed all previous records. And the eligibility guidelines have changed. New York state, for example, received 8.2 million calls last week — more than 150 times the usual volume.

Still, people who have lost

jobs or whose income has been hurt by the coronavirus should keep trying. Many states are bringing on extra workers to handle the crush of applications and are expanding the hours when they accept calls. While it may take several weeks to process a claim, benefit payments will be retroactive: Eligible workers will receive benefits from the date they lost their jobs, regardless of when they

How can i make the process operate more smoothly?

Have all your information ready. This includes contact information for all your employers from the past 18 months, your Social Security number and documentation of your income, such as from tax forms or pay stubs.

How large are the unemployment aid checks?

They vary sharply by state. Mississippi provides the lowest amount, \$235 a week. Massachusetts pays \$823 a week, the highest.

I heard the federal government is approving an extra \$600 a week.

Yes. But because that additional money is being paid by the federal government through a new program, rather than by the states' regular benefits program, you may not receive it as quickly. And state unemployment offices may not be able to answer questions about it just yet.

I'm self-employed. Will i qualify?

Yes, that is one of the changes made by the \$2.2 trillion economic rescue package signed into law by President Donald Trump. If you are self-employed,

a contractor or a gig worker, you are now eligible to claim unemployment benefits. Still, some states, like New Mexico, are not yet set to process claims from groups of people who didn't qualify in the past.

I wasn't laid off, but my employer cut my hours. Will i qualify for benefits?

Yes, you should apply. State rules differ, and it depends how large your income loss is. But in some states, workers whose hours have been sharply cut may be able to claim benefits that would make up for at least some of the lost income. Generally, if your lost pay exceeds what you would receive in unemployment benefits, you may be eligible for aid.

I had to leave work because of the coronavirus but wasn't laid off. What about me?

You can potentially receive benefits, too. The U.S. Labor Department said states can make unemployment benefits available to people who are quarantined, who left work because of risk of exposure or to care for a family member.

That said, someone who receives paid sick leave or paid family leave is often still receiving full pay. So according to the Labor Department, that person is not "unemployed" and does not qualify for unemployment benefits.

What about those \$1,200 checks from the government? When will i get mine?

The federal rescue package provides a one-time payment of \$1,200 for all Americans earning less than \$75,000 a year. This money is totally separate from unemployment benefits—and for the jobless, will be in addition to unemployment aid. It will likely be a critical lifeline for many Americans.

The payments begin to phase out at above \$75,000 for individuals and \$150,000 for couples filing jointly and drop to zero for individuals above \$99,000

and couples earning \$198,000. For heads of household with one child, the benefit starts to decline at \$112,500 and falls to zero at \$146,500. Even those who just receive Social Security or other government benefit programs can receive a check.

A congressional memo obtained by the Associated Press said about 60 million Americans will receive the checks through direct deposit, starting the week of April 12-18. Those payments will go to households that have filed taxes in 2018 or 2019 and that provided the IRS with direct deposit information. For everyone else, checks will be mailed beginning May 4. The paper checks will be issued at a rate of about 5 million a week. which means it could take up to 20 weeks to distribute all the checks. That timeline would delay some checks until the week of Aug. 17.

How long will jobless benefits last?

The duration varies by state.

But the federal relief package
adds 13 weeks of coverage for
people who have exhausted their
existing jobless benefits. Under
the emergency legislation, people who exhaust both regular
and extended benefits will become eligible for Pandemic Unemployment Assistance. People
can receive a maximum of 39
weeks of benefits this year from
all three sources combined.

What about government aid for companies? Can that help me?

It might. Small businesses will be eligible for loans that will be forgiven if they keep or rehire people they have laid off. Those loans will be available starting Friday, according to the Treasury Department. Airlines also should receive financial aid that is intended to prevent layoffs.



Grocery supply chain stabilizing

The meat is back.

So too is a limited supply of eggs and milk.

But toilet paper? Not so fast, shoppers.

Weeks after Southern California's supermarkets were ravaged by hordes of shoppers on a coronavirus buying binge, grocery shelves are gradually returning to normal.

The meat counter was fully stocked early Thursday at an Albertsons in Riverside. There were also ample supplies of produce, dairy and other essentials. Still missing was bread, rice, pasta, flour and packaged quick dinners. And the aisle with toilet paper and paper towels? Virtually empty.

That landscape was similar at a Stater Bros. in Riverside. The meat department looked almost normal, but other staples such as cheese, bread, canned goods and pasta were running low, with some of those items limited to one per person.

Cleaning supplies also were scarce, with every bleach-related item at Stater Bros. sold out.

A shopper at a Vons in Santa Ana reported waning supplies, and not just of water and toi-

let paper. "All sorts of aisles are bare," the shopper said.

It will take some time before all is fully restored at local supermarkets, one industry insider said Thursday.

"I think the food distribution system was overrun by concerned shoppers," said Dave Heylen, vice president for communications at the California Grocers Association, an industry trade group. "It was understandable, but the industry wasn't designed to meet demand like that."

Heylen said food retailers, from the large chains with their own warehouses to smaller ones that depend on wholesalers, have a good grasp on their supply chain during normal times. They understand roughly how many items will be sold on a given day and arrange for deliveries to meet that demand.

The emergency systems are designed to handle regional disasters. he said. If California has a wildfire or Louisiana has a flood, supply lines can be juggled so goods can be shipped from other regions. That system, he said, was not designed to handle a national emergency like the COVID-19 pandemic.

For now, the frantic binge buying seems to have eased.

'Now that people have done all those purchases, the overbuying is over and they're not coming back this week," he said. "The distribution system is catching up."

On March 17, Stater Bros.' CEO Pete Van Helden issued a statement urging consumers to buy only what they need to get through a week. "Calm down," he implored shoppers.

Nancy Negrette, Stater Bros. vice president for corporate affairs, said Thursday that anything not available should be on the shelves in the days that follow, but not if shoppers unnecessarily stock up.

"It's hard to measure, but we are catching up," she said. "The limits we've placed on certain items have given us a chance to do that. We'll still remind customers to shop only for a week's needs."

A manager at the Riverside Albertsons store, who declined to give her name, said their store also is catching up. "The bombardment has eased up, so we're starting to get through it," she said.

Cities Working Non-Stop to Provide Support to First Responders, Businesses, and Residents throughout Coronavirus Pandemic

April 8, 2020

City officials continue to lead the charge against COVID-19 with a variety of actions including orders to wear face coverings in Los Angeles and offering drive-thru coronavirus testing sites in the City of Fremont.

While taking concrete actions to "flatten the curve" by reducing the speed of transmission, cities around the state also recognize the importance of offering support and a boost in morale to residents and local businesses. As we enter nearly the fourth week of the state's stay-at-home order, cities continue to find innovative ways to expand virtual services to their communities, so that residents can continue to receive the services they need.

Recognizing and Supporting First Responders

With personal protective equipment hard to come by, the <u>City of Monterey</u> is working with the <u>Monterey Peninsula Chamber of Commerce</u> to collect masks for first responders. The city is holding the drive April 1-10 and is asking residents, businesses, and nonprofits to donate new N95-rated masks to help protect first responders. Due to high demand and a potential increase in COVID-19 emergency calls, the city is asking members of the public to donate any spare masks they have for use by firefighters, police officers, and public works staff.

The <u>City of San Francisco</u> found a colorful way to show appreciation by lighting up City Hall on designated days in April to thank first responders and health care workers. Every evening at sunset, over 220 LED lighting fixtures illuminate City Hall's exterior. Blue lights are in honor of health care workers; red, white, and blue lights honor first responders; and gold is in honor of front line workers.

Expanding Virtual Access to City Services for Residents

To give residents easy access to basic assistance for services, the City of Half Moon Bay, in coordination with the county, nonprofit, and community-based organizations, offers an online resource center with <u>daily COVID-19 updates</u> for residents, a list of resources including food, shelter, health care, child care, personal financial support, and support for businesses. There is also information on how to help others by volunteering, donating, or supporting local businesses.

The <u>City of Oceanside</u> through its public library has been making "on hold" book deliveries to front doors and holding social media story times.

Supporting the Local Economy

Cities are developing online resources to help residents locate local businesses that are open and providing necessary services during the current stay-at-home order. The <u>City of Redlands</u> launched an interactive map, called Redlands Open for Business, which includes links with information about business hours of operation, location, and additional services offered while practicing physical distancing.

The City of Fullerton asks their residents to support local restaurants during this time and created a dedicated website called <u>Dine Fullerton</u>. The resource includes a list of dining options available, a map, and links to the restaurant's website with hours of operation, and contact information to make it convenient for residents to access food close to their home.

Due to impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic, the <u>City of Long Beach</u> accelerated its launch of the "Work Long Beach" program. With schools, parks, and other children-serving facilities closed, and private organizations temporarily laying off workers, the city recognizes a surplus of certified individuals who are out of work. The program is a collaboration of public agencies and providers that matches out-of-work childcare professionals with families and essential personnel, including low-income families and those in public safety and healthcare. Long Beach is the first in the nation to have this online platform.

"Our hope is that all of the families who provide critical services and risk their lives for our community are able to obtain the childcare that they need during this health crisis," said Long Beach Mayor Robert Garcia.

Staying Connected With and Assisting Vulnerable Populations

Many cities are finding ways to stay connected with their most vulnerable populations during the crisis to keep their spirits up. The City of Culver City is publishing a print newsletter called "Senior Center at Home" which is distributed to 3,000 senior center members in the community. The newsletter includes creative writing projects, health and wellness tips, coronavirus scam info, and online exercise classes.

To encourage older residents to stay safe at home during the coronavirus pandemic, the <u>City of Torrance</u> started its Torrance Cares 2-Go care Package program. City employees prepare and deliver packages which include pre-selected essential grocery and sanitary items that are sourced from an area grocer. The program is geared towards **Torrance residents** including seniors (60

years of age and older), those with disabilities, and with underlying health conditions. The city has been doing the program for just a couple of weeks and already delivered hundreds of packages so far.

Staying Connected Through Community Engagement

Many residents are wondering how they can help their neighbors and communities during this crisis. The <u>City of Menlo Park</u> makes it easy for volunteers to see what opportunities are available by curating resources into one blog post and sharing it through social media platforms to reach residents.

Cities are recognizing and finding ways to keep their communities safe and boost morale. The city of Burbank came up with a campaign called <u>Burbank Together at Home</u>, encouraging the community to Be Supportive, Be Local, Be Active, Be Smart, and Be Kind. Residents can take part in the campaign through social media by using the hashtag #BurbankTogetherAtHome when taking part in a virtual workout, and shopping from a local online retailer. The businesses, resources, and acts of kindness are featured on the city's social media channels on a daily basis and added to the <u>City of Burbank</u> website.

The <u>City of San Marino</u>, and the <u>City of Stockton's Recreation Department</u> are posting on their social media channels to engage the community in physical distancing activities like chalking your walk, at home exercise routines, themed days, and ideas for backyard picnics in order to stay healthy while at home.

As cities work to provide resources and information for their residents, the League continues to update the <u>coronavirus resource</u> and <u>response webpage</u> as a resource for city staff. Daily updates on COVID-19 news, resources, and guidance specifically geared toward local leaders will help local governments navigate the current situation and is updated as new developments occur.

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Policy Committees Go Virtual as Advocacy Efforts Continue During COVID-19 Pandemic

Since the beginning of the pandemic, local leaders have taken extraordinary action to lower the risk of exposure and spread of COVID-19 in their communities.

Cities and organizations across the state are also learning new ways to communicate, and finding creative ways to host meetings in a format that fosters transparency and access, while simultaneously ensuring the safety of participants.

As cities are working around the clock to mitigate the impact of the COVID-19 outbreak in their communities, it is important that the voices of cities, especially in this moment, continue to be heard by the Legislature. City leaders' commitment to this continued advocacy work was on full display last week when more than 600 local officials participated in the League of California Cities' first ever virtual policy committee meetings.

"We're all learning new ways to communicate, both officially and personally. Teleconferencing is replacing traditional public council meetings – and it's exciting to see our policy committee meetings offered in this new format," said League President John F. Dunbar in a welcome address to each of the policy committees.

The seven standing policy committee meetings, which were held via webinar over the course of April 2-3, met to review and discuss key bills pending in the Legislature that impact cities. Due to the COVID-19 outbreak, the Legislature is on recess until May 4, but it is important, now more than ever, that state legislators hear local voices and understand the needs of cities.

The meetings featured remarks from League President Dunbar and Executive Director Carolyn Coleman, followed by engaging discussions on the COVID-19 impact to cities, key pending legislation, and the status of the state budget, facilitated by the League's legislative representatives. The top highlights of the policy committee meetings are below.

Public Safety Policy Committee

The Public Safety Policy Committee took action on <u>AB 2598 (Bonta and Chiu)</u>. This measure would require a California law enforcement agency, before entering into Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with a federal law enforcement agency for participation in the Federal Bureau of Investigation's Joint Terrorism Task Force, to submit the proposed MOU and any related guidelines to its governing body for approval. Ultimately, after a robust conversation, the

committee voted to oppose this measure. The Public Safety Policy Committee slides can be found on the <u>League's website</u>.

Community Services Policy Committee

The Community Services Policy Committee had an engaging discussion on <u>AB 1936 (Rodriguez)</u>, which would expand the current prohibition on public emergency price gouging to include utility-initiated power shutoffs. This measure was received favorably by the committee. The committee also discussed the various impacts that COVID-19 has had on providing vital community services. Environmental Quality Policy Committee

The Environmental Quality Policy Committee was provided an overview of the California Public Utilities Commission's (CPUC) rulemaking to consider revisions to Electric Rule 20. Specifically, the CPUC issued a staff proposal in February that recommends sunsetting the existing Rule 20A and Rule 20D programs over a 10-year period, and including wildfire mitigation as an eligible project use for Rule 20A funds. League staff encouraged committee members to become parties to this proceeding and submit comments to the CPUC by the April 21, 2020 deadline. Housing, Community and Economic Development Policy Committee

The Housing, Community, and Economic Development Policy Committee was provided with a legislative update on measures related to planning and zoning, accessory dwelling units, affordable housing, homelessness, mitigation and development fees, mobile homes, and tax increment financing. The committee also received an update on the League's housing production proposal. More information on the League's proposal can be found on the League's Housing webpage. Governance, Transparency, and Labor Relations Policy Committee

The Governance, Transparency, and Labor Relations Policy Committee was provided with a legislative update on measures related to disallowed compensation, evidentiary privilege, email retention, public records, employee release time, employment discrimination, and the high risk local government agency audit program. The committee also had a robust conversation on ACA 5 (Weber), which if approved by the Legislature, and then the voters, would repeal Section 31 of Article I of the California Constitution. This section of the California Constitution was added by Proposition 209 of 1996. It prohibits cities and other governments from discriminating or giving preferential treatment to any individual or group on the basis of race, sex, color, ethnicity, or national original with regard to public employment, public contracting, or public education. After a thoughtful conversation, the committee ultimately voted to defer taking a position on ACA 5 until more information is provided at a future date. Revenue and Taxation Policy Committee

The Revenue and Taxation Policy Committee received an update on the latest actions the League has taken to better understand the fiscal impact that COVID-19 will have on cities and allowed time for policy committee members to share their own experiences.

The committee also received a legislative update, and League staff solicited feedback from policy committee members on two bills. The first measure was <u>AB 3009 (Mullin)</u>, which would change the formula for calculating a successor agency's administrative cost allowance.

The second measure was <u>SB 1072 (McGuire)</u>, which would authorize the option for a city to enact an ordinance exclusively delegating its authority to collect any transient occupancy tax (TOT) imposed by that local agency on short-term rentals to the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration and to enter into a contract with the department to perform all functions incident to the collection and administration of any TOT imposed on a short-term rental. Transportation, Communications, and Public Works Policy Committee

The Transportation, Communications, and Public Works Policy Committee covered two bills on their legislative agenda in depth. The first measure, <u>AB 2215 (Chau)</u>, would exclude electric vehicle charging stations from the definition of a service station. The second bill, <u>AB 3277 (Jones-Sawyer)</u>, would increase the total amount of unpaid parking violations that can be paid by installments. Both of these bills were originally slated to be action items for the committee. However, in light of impacts COVID-19 has had on state legislative deadlines and the budget, it is unclear what the future holds for both measures. 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League-Sponsored Bond Agency Issues More than \$51 Million in Tax-Exempt Bonds for Affordable Housing in Oxnard

Affordable apartments for low-income families and seniors in Oxnard are getting renovations and funding with tax-exempt, multi-family affordable housing bonds issued by the California Statewide Communities Development Authority (CSCDA).

Holiday Manor Apartments, LP acquired Holiday Manor, which includes 252 multi-family affordable housing units for low-income residents. Under the new ownership, the apartments will continue to be 100 percent affordable.

CSCDA and Spira partnered with Capital One Bank to provide the \$51,250,000 in tax-exempt, multi-family affordable housing bonds for Holiday Manor.

The project will undergo an extensive interior and exterior renovation, ensuring that residents have an updated, safe, and affordable community to call home for years to come. The financing of Holiday Manor will maintain the affordability of units for low-income tenants for 55 years.

The League's co-sponsorship of CSCDA continues to be a significant benefit for League members. CSCDA has issued more than \$63 billion in tax-exempt bonds for projects that provide a public benefit by creating jobs, affordable housing, healthcare, infrastructure, schools, and other fundamental services.

CSCDA is a joint powers authority created in 1988 and is sponsored by the California State Association of Counties and the League of California Cities. More than 530 cities, counties, and special districts are program participants in CSCDA, which serves as their conduit issuer, and provides access to efficiently financed, locally-approved projects.

Message from League Executive Director Carolyn Coleman on Coronavirus Response

April 8, 2020

Dear California City Leaders,

Health officials across the country have warned that the coming days are going to be the hardest and most devastating to date of the coronavirus pandemic. Cases have been confirmed in 53 of 58 California counties. As of April 7, the California Department of Public Health has confirmed 15,865 cases and 374 deaths in the state. By the end of the week, there will be many more.

While the numbers are certainly grim, there is also a glimmer of hope for California. As Governor Newsom announced yesterday, California's efforts against COVID-19 are slowing the spread of the novel coronavirus. Experts attribute the apparent "flattening of the curve" to the early directives to curb social interaction and the public's following of those directives. The earliest directives came from local leaders. As a result of those actions, lives are being saved in real time.

I commend you all for your commitment and leadership as you continue to protect your cities while continuing to provide essential services for your residents.

The tremendous health and financial impacts from the pandemic are and will continue to be painful for weeks, and months to come. Here at the League, our focus is on getting cities of all sizes the resources needed to ensure the health and safety of our communities and to navigate these uncharted waters. The League also continues to curate timely resources for cities on our <u>COVID-19 resource webpage</u> and has launched a COVID-19 webinar series to provide additional information on strategies for maintaining continuity of city operations during this unprecedented period. More information on all of these efforts is included below.

League calls on state and federal governments for fiscal assistance to cities. To address the necessary increases in spending and unavoidable revenue shortfalls faced by nearly all California local governments, the League is joining with the National League of Cities and our federal representatives to call on Congress to advance a fourth emergency appropriations package with direct aid available to all cities in need, regardless of population. This follows the \$2 trillion CARES Act, passed last month, which provides financial assistance to individuals and small businesses on the economic margins, as well as \$150 billion in direct aid to state and local governments (with populations greater than 500,000) to help offset the new costs directly related to the pandemic.

To help California small businesses weather the storm, last week, the Governor announced that

the state will allow small businesses to defer payment of sales and use taxes of up to \$50,000, a primary source of funding for California local governments, for 12 months. While we understand the need to support our Main Street businesses, these deferrals will have a devastating impact on local budgets. The current crisis has led to an increase in spending, along with revenue shortfalls, especially in sales taxes. We are calling on the state Legislature and the Governor to support a similar package of relief as the federal one at the state level.

COVID-19 Webinar Series. To assist city officials with their response to the pandemic, the League developed a COVID-19 Webinar Series. The first two installments of the series have featured a <u>special update on the CARES Act from the National League of Cities</u> and covered best practices for suspending parking requirements. The next webinar is tomorrow, and will discuss the impact of emergency orders and declarations, preemption of local declarations under State and count orders, and next steps after declaring an emergency. County officials to waive penalties on a case-by-case basis for property owners unable to pay by the April 10 property tax deadline. One of the League's primary advocacy efforts during COVID-19 has been focused on maintaining essential municipal services and infrastructure during this crisis, which is why we urged the Governor to retain the April 10 deadline for property tax payments and support local officials waiving penalties for property owners who are unable to pay by that date due to the pandemic, as authorized by law. On April 4, the Governor announced his support for the decision made by county officials to waive penalties on a case-by-case basis.

I remain in awe of the leadership shown by our city leaders. Our residents, and state and federal governments are looking to cities small and large to lead during this crisis, and cities are rising to the occasion.

Thank you for your leadership. Please stay safe and healthy.
