Dear Mr. Billingsley:

On behalf of the City of Garden Grove, I am writing this letter in support of 360 PACE and its application to the State of California and Centers for Medicare and Medicaid (CMS) to establish a Program for All-Inclusive Care for the Elderly (PACE) Center in Orange County. Aided by the cultural competency of its bilingual interdisciplinary team, the organization aims to focus on the underserved Vietnamese population to significantly improve their lives.

PACE programs have long demonstrated the ability to significantly improve the lives of the very frail and elderly, and as such PACE services should be made more available to residents of Orange County and of surrounding communities.

The City of Garden Grove in Orange County has the largest Vietnamese population outside of Vietnam. This PACE program would support 400 underserved seniors who would otherwise require skilled nursing care to live independently in the community. 360 PACE's program would coordinate essential medical and social services while also providing inhome care services, rehabilitative therapies, and transportation to the PACE Center for medical appointments.

360 has a history of serving uninsured and underserved communities. During the pandemic, 360 partnered with the Orange County Health Care Agency to run two super sites offering drive-thru COVID testing, as well as established 37 walk-up kiosks across the county. It has served over 400,000 Orange County residents, more than 50% of whom are uninsured patients.

We respectfully ask that the California Department of Health Care Services give due consideration to 360 PACE to establish a PACE center in Orange County. Thank you in advance for your consideration.

The repair work for the pump station consists of replacement of the existing engine and booster pump, replacement of the existing exhaust system, replacement of the existing catalytic converter, replacement of two 10-inch butterfly valves, replacement of the 10-inch check valve, refurbishment of the existing flow control valve, and replacement of the roof and existing removable dormer.

• SCADA Implementation Project – The SCADA Master Plan has recommended 22 projects to be implemented over a 5-year period. The City is seeking for Program Management Services to facilitate the detailed design and implementation of these recommendations.

- Alwood Ave and Anthony Ave Water Improvement Project This water main replacement
 project includes two of the high priority fire flow capacity deficient areas identified in the 2020
 Water Master Plan. Project consists of approximately 1,300 ft of 12-in diameter pipe, 2,850 ft of
 8-in diameter pipe including hydrants, fittings and appurtenances, trenching, backfilling,
 compaction, and pipe disinfection and testing.

 County Orangewood and Dale Water Improvement Project — This water main replacement project includes replacing over 7,500 ft of 6-in diameter main replacement with 8-inch main. In addition, this project will replace 12 of the dry-barrel hydrants with wet barrel hydrants. This will help improve the fire flow in this area.

Well 19 is one of the wells that has PFAS concentrations that are above the response levels.



Pastor charged with sexually assaulting girls in Orange County and Riverside

SANTA ANA — A Santa Ana pastor was charged Tuesday with sexually assaulting three girls he met through churches in Riverside, Garden Grove and Santa Ana.

Carlos Ramirez Valdez, 57, of Riverside, was charged with five counts of lewd or lascivious acts with a minor younger than 14 and three counts of oral copulation or sexual penetration of a child 10 or younger, all felonies. He also faces a sentencing enhancement for multiple victims.

Valdez was arrested Friday at a Los Alamitos construction site where he works, according to Santa Ana Police Cpl. Sonia Rojo.

Valdez was being held on \$1 million bail, according to jail records.

Valdez is pastor of International Mission Church USA at 505 S. Main St., Rojo said. From 2014-2017, he was a member of Iglesia De Dios Ebenezer Church at 2020 W. Chestnut Ave. in Santa Ana, Rojo said.

At that church he allegedly lured an 8-year-old girl into a van during a service and sexually assaulted her, Rojo said. Valdez is accused of repeatedly assaulting the girl in the van over a period of three years.

Another victim told Riverside police in January 2020 she was molested by Valdez in 2017 when she was eight, Rojo said. Also in January 2020, another alleged victim went to Garden Grove police saying Valdez molested her in 2015, according to the corporal.

Orange County prosecutors will handle the case against Valdez for the alleged crimes in Riverside County.

Norco Marine Kareem Nikoui died 'doing what he loved,' pastor says at funeral

A crowd memorialized the 20-year-old Norco High School graduate at a Saturday, Sept. 18, celebration of life in Riverside

They came to say farewell to a local hero.

Family, friends and members of the public packed a Riverside church Saturday, Sept. 18, for an approximately two-hour final salute to Marine Lance Cpl. Kareem Mae'Lee Grant Nikoui.

Before the service, a solemn and quiet gathering of hundreds looked on as the Norco resident's casket was carried into Harvest Christian Fellowship. A massive flag dangled from the raised ladder of Riverside Fire Department truck outside the church.

Later, the celebration-of-life service began.

The ceremony, which drew an estimated crowd of 2,000 plus, included speeches, songs and a video of Nikoui's life, set to music. The video included photos of him as a young boy, transitioning to a confident young man skiing, hiking, playing with a dog, hanging out with siblings, celebrating victories at jiu-jitsu tournaments and proudly wearing his Marine uniform.

The 20-year-old former Jr. ROTC student — who graduated from Norco High School in 2019 — was killed in an attack on Afghanistan's Kabul airport Aug. 26, days before the planned withdrawal of U.S. troops.

The fallen Marine, one of 13 service members who died in that bombing, has been honored at a handful of public remembrances the past few weeks.

The service began with the song, "Lord, I Need You" and featured such tunes as "Days of Elijah," a favorite of Nikoui's from his time at Camp Pendleton. The audience sang along when singer-guitarist Coffey Anderson performed "Amazing Grace." Shyler Chappell, Nikoui's sister shared that "Kareem had been talking about becoming a Marine for as long as I can remember."

He even used to camp in a tent in their backyard, she recalled.

Chappell said she heard how her brother — who would have turned 21 on Jan. 4 — went back inside the Kabul airport to pull children to safety.

"It didn't surprise me that those were his last moments," she said.

Still, she said, "I would give everything to hear him laugh again."

Phil Wozniak, pastor of Grace Fellowship Church in Norco, which Nikoui attended, also addressed the young man's last act.

He pulled three families to safety at the Kabul airport — "and then he went back for a small child when the bomb went off," Wozniak said.

"He died doing what he loved."

The Marine's aunt, Yvette Nikoui-Smith, called him "one tough kid" who was "always happy-go-lucky."

Steve Nikoui, the Marine's father, choked up as he spoke. His son had a great sense of humor and became a jiu-jitsu champion, Steve Nikoui said.

It's no wonder, Wozniak said, because Kareem Nikoui was known for challenging the biggest person in his jiu-jitsu class.

Steve Nikoui said he was most proud, however, of his son's Christian faith.

Harvest Pastor Greg Laurie called Kareem Nikoui "a genuine American hero, Mr. Red, White and Blue."

He posed the question: "Why did God allow this to happen?" And answered by saying: "There is no answer to the why question."

This is a time to mourn, Laurie told the crowd.

"You need to cry. You need to cry a lot. The Bible says there is a time to laugh and a time to mourn ... We grieve hopefully because we we will see Kareem again."

As the service concluded, the audience stood while "Taps" was played.

"All gave some, some gave all," a recorded song declared as photos of a uniformed Nikoui filled the giant screen.

Nikoui was brought home Friday, Sept. 17, a day after U.S. Central Command announced the service members who died last month would be posthumously awarded Purple Hearts for their sacrifice. The medals will go to their next of kin.

A Friday afternoon procession from Ontario International Airport saw flag-waving residents turn out along the route through Norco and to Pierce Brothers Crestlawn Mortuary in Riverside.

Two other Marines from the Inland area died in the bombing: Lance Cpl. Dylan R. Merola, 20, of Rancho Cucamonga and Cpl. Hunter Lopez, 22, of Indio. A memorial service was staged Saturday morning in Palm Springs for Lopez.

A procession to salute Merola is set for Tuesday, Sept. 21; his funeral will be Sunday, Sept. 26, in Covina.

At Harvest, the large crowd Saturday included Kris Hager, of Parrish, Florida, who came to stand with Nikoui's family.

"I lost my son in '07," he said. "I know what it's like."

Also among the guests was Norco resident Jessica Rodriguez and her 7-year-old son, Easton Berns.

"It hit our town hard. Very hard," Rodriguez said.

Easton, who knows the Nikoui family, said, "I'm sad."

Rodriguez added that, despite the loss, it has "been great to see the community come together for this."

Faataitai Atuatasi came from Garden Grove to Riverside.

He didn't know the Marine but said his heart went out to the family.

Hate jumped in Orange County last year; so did push back

The new 2020 Hate Crimes Report finds huge rise in actions directed at Asians and others. In response, neighbors, prosecutors and police are speaking out.

Orange County witnessed an astronomical rise last year in anti-Asian discrimination, with big jumps in both hate incidents and hate crimes, largely fueled by misplaced anger over the coronavirus pandemic.

The finding is part of the 2020 Orange County Hate Crimes Report released Friday, Sept. 17. This year's report, titled <u>Tolerating Racism is Racism</u>, found 76 of the 263 hate incidents reported in the county last year targeted people of Asian descent. In previous years, the county had about 5 anti-Asian hate incidents annually. And continuing a <u>disturbing trend</u> that began in 2015, the number of hate crimes overall last year rose again in Orange County, jumping 35%, the biggest single-year increase in the past decade. Nearly half of the 112 hate crimes in 2020 were anti-Black, anti-Semitic or anti-Hispanic. The report also found seven anti-Asian hate crimes.

State law defines hate crimes as criminal acts motivated by gender, nationality, race, religion, sexual orientation or disability. A hate incident — such as public distribution of non-threatening racist fliers — is biased behavior targeted at someone because of the same actual or perceived characteristics that does not rise to the level of a crime. Hate incidents often are protected as free speech under the First Amendment.

Community representatives discussed the findings — and some local responses to violent bigotry — during a Zoom webinar hosted Friday by the OC Human Relations Commission with the report's release. The Commission compiles hate-related data annually based on reports made by law enforcement, schools, and the community at large.

The virtual talk included Orange County District Attorney Todd Spitzer and others who are pressing for a stronger response to hate.

"I'm very upset about it," said Spitzer, who earlier this year <u>created a special Hate</u> <u>Crimes unit</u> — including three prosecutors and two investigators — to prosecute hate crimes.

"Hate crime is up; it's been up now several years in a row," Spitzer said. "And it's completely unacceptable."

Perennial targets

Last year, the Orange County District Attorney's Office reviewed 30 possible hate crimes submitted by local police agencies. The agency prosecuted 18 of those cases, with eight of the filings involving specific hate crime charges, the report said.

Overall, hate incidents in Orange County last year rose nearly 70% from the previous year. That included 94 anti-Semitic hate incidents, the most documented in the annual report. The report also referenced 38 hate incidents targeting Black people and 15 targeting Hispanic people.


Black people, who make up slightly more than 2% of Orange County's population, were the victims of more than one-quarter of the hate crimes (30) reported last year, making them the most likely to be targeted for such incidents.

Spitzer observed how Black people have been "systematically targeted in Orange County, just like people from the Middle East." And, he added, members of the LGBTQ community "are always targeted, and always singled out."

Racial hate reports in OC

Hate incidents in Orange County jumped 68% from 2019 to 2020. In this past year alone, the Orange County Hurran Relations Commission has seen an increase in racial violence and injustice among communities of color, in particular towards the Asian and Black community, a trend that is nationwide.



The 2020 report calls the rise in hate incidents "alarming." In addition to the skyrocketing anti-Asian sentiments, anti-Semitic incidents rose 114% and anti-Black incidents 23%. The most hate incidents were reported last year in the months of March (46) and April (32), when COVID-19 stayhome orders went into full effect.

The report describes such verbal attacks as:

- A stranger yelling "f—ing Chinese. Coronavirus" at an Asian family near a gas station
- A Black woman called the n-word by a neighbor
- Expletives and the n-word hurled at people protesting the police murder of George Floyd
- · An anti-immigrant video posted on Twitter
- A transvestite woman being told "people like you shouldn't live"

Community action

But even as hate incidents and hate crimes were on the rise, the county also witnessed broad push back against bigotry, from grassroots responses to formal anti-hate efforts by prosecutors and some police.

In her introduction to the report, Jo-Anne Matsuba, chair of OC Human Relations Commission, characterized the push back as "tremendous resilience and eagerness to address these different areas of injustice."

Orange County is home to the third largest population of Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders in the country. From grassroots organizations to elected officials, Asian Americans and the larger community in Orange County <u>rallied to denounce</u> the COVID-19 anti-Asian hate.

One example: The city councils in Garden Grove and Irvine, and the Orange County Board of Supervisors, all passed resolutions condemning anti-Asian behavior on the same day, responding to a letter urging such action from the Center for Asian Americans in Action. In all, 15 O.C. cities eventually would adopt such resolutions or proclamations.

During the Zoom meeting Friday, Priscilla Huang, executive director of the Center for Asian Americans in Action, described the <u>harassment</u> and physical intimidation faced by a Chinese family in Ladera Ranch. A group of teens in the area pounded on the

family's front door, threw rocks at their windows and left obscene materials. The family installed a fence and cameras, but the harassment continued. At night, the two young children couldn't sleep; the parents took turns patrolling the yard, Huang said. Finally, a neighbor rallied others who helped keep watch. The community reaction grew, Huang said, and by late February it blossomed into a huge gathering to mark the Lunar New Year.

That family's experience — if not the community's response — reminded Huang of discrimination she faced growing up.

"I wish someone had done that for us when we were kids and my parents were just starting in this country," Huang said of the support eventually offered to the family in Ladera Ranch.

Growing empathy

Last summer, 128 people, including some from around the country, participated in a Zoom "virtual vigil" held by the Black congregation New Hope Presbyterian Church in Orange to talk about the death of George Floyd. Weeks earlier, on May 25, 2020, Floyd died when a Minneapolis police officer knelt on his neck during an arrest — a murder that sparked protests around the world, including in Orange County. On the law enforcement side, Spitzer announced in May the formation of the Hate Crimes Unit dedicated to investigating and prosecuting incidents connected to bigotry. That came two months after the Irvine Police Department created a new online portal for citizens to report hate crimes and hate incidents.

The <u>OC Human Relations Commission</u> launched its own anti-hate initiative called "To Know Better" that promoted understanding and cultural acceptance among high school and middle school students. The commission also has sponsored "OC Together" community dialogues on race relations. (The next OC Together event is planned for October.)

Douglas Haynes, vice chancellor for equity, diversity and inclusion at UC Irvine, called for a much broader plan and strategy, saying in the Zoom talk that this point in Orange County's history represents "a novel moment in time."

"It's baffling that we're so diverse and yet still contending with increases in hate incidents and hate crimes," Haynes said. "I'm convinced we have the capacity as a community to really improve."



Best thing I ate: a Vietnamese pho that stands out from the crowd

Critic Brad A. Johnson says that when it comes to the Vietnamese noodle soup known as pho, the broth is everything. And the broth at Pho Akaushi in Garden

I've lost track of how many bowls of Vietnamese pho I've consumed over the years in Orange County. It's a big number. Eighty? Ninety? Something in that ballpark, many of which have been very, very good.

As I was thinking about this, I began to ponder the number of bowls of very good pho whose broth I would happily slurp on its own without any accompaniments whatsoever (never mind whether anyone would actually do that). Imagine the pho consisting only of broth: no meat, no sprouts, no noodles, no herbs... just a big bowl of liquid. Because when it comes to pho, the broth is everything (except, of course, when the oxtail is everything).

I can come up with only two.

The first such broth was at a wonderful but short-lived restaurant in Garden Grove called Rice Paper, which opened in 2013 and closed a year later. The second such soup is the one I ate last week at Pho Akaushi, also in Garden Grove.

Pho Akaushi makes its broth from the bones of American wagyu beef. More specifically, the beef is Akaushi, the line of Japanese wagyu from which the restaurant borrows its name. In this case, the Akaushi beef comes from a ranch in Texas. Like a textbook French consommé, the broth is beautifully colored yet perfectly clear. It tastes beefy and rich. It is highly fragrant and viscous without the slightest bit of grease floating on top that one might expect from a soup made from such fatty beef. The color begins to change and turn slightly opaque as raw beef and well-done brisket (also wagyu) are added at the last minute before it's served. It comes with the usual bean sprouts and an herb bundle of basil, pigweed and purslane, the latter adding a uniquely peppery punch. You can choose between thin or flat noodles. Either way, this is a great bowl of soup.

Pho Akaushi originally opened a few years ago in the food court on the second floor of the Saigon Supermarket in Garden Grove. The owners soon branched out and opened a pop-up (which became a permanent fixture) inside OC 7\$, a Vietnamese seafood restaurant in Westminster that specializes in snails.

A few months ago, they opened their first stand-alone location on Garden Grove Boulevard, just behind Stanton's wildly popular Rodeo 39 Public Market. There's a good pho restaurant there, but this place is ever better.

Sacramento – Following the Governor's signing of Senate Bill 9 (Atkins), League of California Cities Executive Director and CEO Carolyn Coleman released the below statement:

"We are disappointed in the signing of this flawed legislation. SB 9 undermines the ability of local governments to responsibly plan for the types of housing that communities need, circumvents the local government review process, and silences community voices. Even worse, there are no provisions in SB 9 that require new housing to be affordable, continuing the cycle of the construction of new units that are out of reach for many working-class families.

"Cities are committed to planning and zoning for more housing in a manner that acknowledges state housing goals, but also respects community input and involvement. Significant work is already underway in cities throughout the state to bring down the high cost of housing in our communities. By the end of 2022, all of the state's major regional governments, including cities, will have identified and planned for more than two million units of additional housing statewide.

"Despite this top-down mandate that disregards local voices and decision-making, Cal Cities will continue to explore all options to ensure local governments have the necessary tools and resources to plan for the types of housing actually needed in their communities."

"In combination with the Budget Trailer Bill, SB 156, our State has made a generational commitment of \$7.5 billion to guarantee internet connectivity for all Californians and their local governments, rural and urban. Now the hard work of deployment begins, and as a former Mayor and current Chair of the Assembly Local Government Committee, I look forward to working with my colleagues in local government to dismantle barriers to ensure our mutual constituents are digitally connected."

Sen. Laird was also instrumental in securing \$60 million in the budget for grants for cities to help implement SB 1383, and \$70 million for organics infrastructure.
